Age 91, passed away October 1, 2008 due to complications with pneumonia after surgery. Max was born in Coldwater Oct. 22, 1916, and lived much of his early life in Quincy, MI. He worked as an electrical lineman in several states as well as on large projects, such the Niagra River Hydroelectric Project and was a member of the Foreign Legion and the IBEW. Max served in the US Navy in a Construction Battalion during the Second World War. Max had no middle name: Two uncles, Wallace and William, both wanted him to carry their names and Max's mother, in a diplomatic move, split the difference with the letter "W". He had a fondness for simple pleasures, ice cream, strawberries, card games (especially cribbage), popcorn, sports, and horses. He is survived by his sons, Lynn (Nancy) Houck, Joel W. Houck Sr., and Max M (Lucy ) Houck and daughter- in -law, Sally Houck .
